SIERRA LEONE/JERICHO ROAD GLOBAL OUTREACH:

MEMORIAL DAY CANDLE CROSS SERVICE

It was an honor and a privilege for St. Peter's to host the West Seneca Joint Veterans Committee for a moving worship service in observance of Memorial Day. The service featured the presentation of colors by the Veterans Committee, music from "Strike The Rock" - the church's contemporary Christian music group – including "O Beautiful for Spacious Skies" and "God Bless the USA," and an American flag dedication in memory of Charlie Hunt, proud veteran and good and faithful servant. Jim Manley proudly carried the new flag into the sanctuary. Pastor Paula reminded us of the words of King David to his son, "Be strong. Be courageous. Be faithful." There was also a lighting of the church's Memorial Candle Cross in honor of members of the armed forces and first responders who have given their lives in defense of our nation and in service of others, in memory of members of the St. Peter's church family, and in honor of special family bonds. The service was followed by a potluck luncheon in the church's fellowship hall.














































Memorial Day is one of America's long-standing holidays, and has been in place since the end of the Civil War as a day of remembrance and gratitude for those who died in service to their country. Today we remember

fallen heroes and pray that no heroes will ever have to die for us again.

One group represented in the Veterans Committee is the Seabees. Although they had major contributions in all theaters, a documentary which ran on PBS online, narrated by CBS Sports' Jim Nantz, "The Seabees on Iwo Jima," focuses on the United States Naval Construction Battalions in World War II. The Seabees were construction workers by trade but had to fight at times, following their motto, "We Build, We Fight."

Between the World Wars, the idea of a naval construction battalion was just an idea, but in mid-December of 1941, it became essential to winning World War II. Millions of America's laborers applied. Men, some 30, 40, 50, and even 60 years old, answered the call. They would eventually build the runways, bases, Quonset huts, hospitals, docks, ports, and infrastructure needed in Europe and the Pacific. Just weeks after Pearl Harbor, the first official military trained Naval Construction Battalion, or Seabees, shipped out for overseas duty.

With rifles slung over their shoulders and riding bulldozers, Seabees first began coming ashore at Guadalcanal, arriving one month after the August 7, 1942, landings by the 1st Marine Division. After Guadalcanal, there would be many more Pacific islands for the Seabees such as Guam, Saipan, and Tinian, By war's end, the Seabees had built an amazing 111 major airstrips across the Pacific, where before only jungle and coral had existed. On the morning of February 19, 1945, United States Navy Seabees, along with Marines of the 4th and 5th Marine Divisions, found themselves heading toward an island roughly 760 miles from the Japanese mainland, Iwo Jima. On that same historic day, a section of the 23rd Special Seabees, an all-African-American stevedore outfit attached to the 5th Marine Amphibious Corps, also hit the beach at Iwo Jima. The 23rd would support the Marines for the rest of the fight on Iwo Jima.

By mid-March of 1945, following a lot of building and fighting by the Seabees in support of the United States Marines, two airstrips had been secured on Iwo Jima and were being repaired. Soon after, American P-51 fighters and shattered B-29 bombers began to safely arrive, even as fighting was still ongoing between the Marines, Seabees, and Japanese. The carnage on Iwo Jima cost the Navy Seabees dearly. Hundreds were dead and wounded, the Seabees' highest casualty rate of World War II.

Today we light candles to honor, recognize and remember the men and women who sacrificed all in service to their country, from the Civil War through Afghanistan and Iraq, and other spots around the world.
